I 'm glad I no longer have to commute up to the Hudson Valley every week, but one thing I really miss, especially this time of year, are the Autumn colors along the interstate highways during the month of October. By about the time this comes out, the colors will probably be peaking as brilliant oranges, reds and yellows, with just enough evergreen in the mix to remind you that there is no more gifted artist than the One who created the natural world in all of its splendor.

f course, like so much of the natural world's most breath-taking miracles, this one is fleeting. A couple of weeks and we will have gone from the lush green of summer, through the full palette of fall colors, and finally come to the grey nakedness that will stay with us until the Spring. It's funny, if you think about it, but it is not when the trees are in their prime season that they are the most beautiful, but in the final few weeks before they give in to the inevitable coming of the end, their final explosion of color, a last great dance before the darkness enfolds them, perhaps even a display of joyous gratitude for the life that they enjoyed. But even more than that, their final show of glory is also a kind of promise, like a shooting star reminding us to look up, even as it makes it final arc across the sky, and see in its arc, not a sinking into oblivion, but a sign pointing to the infinite number of lights still shining in the midnight sky, waiting for their chance to shoot across the sky, their moment to shine across the night sky. I love the beauty of

the changing leaves, even though I am not a fan of the cold, dark, months that follow. The rich colors remind me of the truth that all things have their season but also remind me that with every ending is the promise of a new beginning; the leaves will be back, and that new life is already preparing for its season, even as the old one is celebrating its last great hurrah.

I ife is change. Like the One who created it, it is dynamic, it never stands still. More than that, life is insistent, it will not be denied. Even as the dead leaves lay on the ground, they are leaching nutrients into the earth to feed the seeds beginning already to grow as they wait their time to break through the earth and reach up into the sky. It is not life that is short, but rather, death; as God's will to create keeps transforming it into life, each in its due season, each unique, yet all of them as eternal as change itself.

f course, life may be dynamic and all about change, but for a lot of us, that seems like a cross. We yearn for permanency, for things that are eternal. The scripture tells us that we are made in image of God, from the love that is the very essence of God, a God who is sure and as steadfast as eternity itself. We yearn to know that steadfastness in a world which seems to be not simply changing but spinning off its axis. We want a faith that is the same today as it was yesterday and as it will be tomorrow, a faith whose bulwark are the unchanging commandments of an unchanging God.

 γ hat we sometimes might miss, though, is that we already have that. We have a God who so loved the world that he became one of us in Jesus of Nazareth. That God gave us the Great Commandments to love our God with all our being and to love our neighbors as ourselves, not just with warm feelings or even heart-felt prayers alone, but with our whole being, with open hands, open hearts, and open minds. God gave us brains to think with, not just to blindly trust, or follow an ecclesial authority, but to discern together what those commandments require of us in any given situation, and to try and build, as we learn and grow in God's faith and love together, on the traditions and the doctrines of the church across time as well as space.

Tust as importantly, our God calls on us to learn J and to grow, to walk with Jesus through the transformative process of discipleship and that is all about that arduous process of discernment, of separating the wheat from the chaff, of repentance, and of letting go of that which was in favor of welcoming the new thing that God is doing.

When we understand what is most important, the light of God's love lived in the lives of God's people, then we can open ourselves up without fear to whatever each new day will bring. Like the trees, as we too go through life's many changes, we do not need to be afraid, or to cling desperately to that which was, because we will rest in the assurance that after the great and glorious days of Autumn, through the death of winter, God's love is present, hard at work, making loves' new manifestations and life's new miracles, just in time for Spring.

always feel a little wistful when I see those L beautiful Autumn leaves because I tend to think of their beautiful display as a last hurrah, before the coming of the season of darkness. But in fact, maybe it is just our Creator reminding us, that she'll be back, and we ain't seen nothing yet!

Leaf Peeping – I did not know this was a "thing". Seems I am far from the only person who enjoys admiring the vibrant fall colors. Turns out it is a BIG thing with a long history. This purposeful appreciation of the changing colors of the leaves can be traced back over a thousand years to a Japanese practice called "hunting leaves". Who knew?

O ktoberfest is a fun tradition for beer lovers such as me. This celebration starts the third weekend of September and ends the first Sunday of October. Yup, we missed it. Oktoberfest started as a celebration of the wedding of Prince Ludwig of Bavaria to Princess Therese on October 12, 1810. The people had such a good time, they decided to do it again every year!

Trick-or-Treating – This was one of the highlights of my childhood years. As you may know, Halloween has roots in the pagan festival Samhain. Dressing up in costume, (think disguise), was originally done to drive away unwanted spirits. When Halloween became popular here in the US in the 1920s, it was an opportunity for pranking by rowdy young people. Trick-or-treating was a clever way to stop the pranksters by providing treats.

Bobbing for Apples – Does anyone still do this? I'm not sure I ever have... Anyway, this became a fall tradition only because fall is apple season. It originated as a British courting ritual. Young women would try to snatch the apple representing the man they hoped to wed. If she got it on the first try, the couple would have a long and happy relationship. Just a little weird, no? At least we can thank Covid for putting that practice soundly to bed!



Festival of Miniature Christmas Trees and The Twelve Cookies of Christmas



Superfoods for the Brain

You've heard the phrase, "You are what you eat," and the same holds true when it comes to the health of your brain! Fueling one's body with the right nutrients and minerals can have positive effects on your overall health and wellness. The brain needs a variety of healthy foods that help stimulate its focus, memory, and cognitive function at any age. You may wish to give some of these *Brain Superfoods* a try!

- **Eggs**~ Egg yolks are rich in Vitamin D, which research has found may help protect against memory loss and forgetfulness.
- *Extra Virgin Olive Oil*~ Compounds found in this oil may increase mental focus and slow a decline in thinking skills, researchers say.
