# Paradise: Lost and Found

love the summer. Even if I don't do much L other than take naps on the deck or hang out at the beach, summer is the time when it seems like we have at least a little bit of a respite from the craziness of life in the early 21<sup>st</sup> century. And, hey, Long Island shines in the summer! We have beautiful beaches, great surf, fishing, boating, concerts, you name it, not to mention great bars and some of the best restaurants in the country. Summer rocks from Rockaway to Montauk and everywhere in between. Winter is potholes and freezing wind, but on those beautiful summer days, a cooling breeze in your hair, the smell of salt water in your nostrils, our island in all of its full glory, it almost seems just a little bit like a glimpse of the "mountaintop." Only this time, God's image is made manifest in the perfection of the days, reflected in the platinum glow of the few clouds that serve only to offset the beautiful blue of the sky, not one shade of blue, but infinite shades, melding together as they move across the sky. Paradise!

It's not hard to understand, then, why we want to preserve our way of life, especially those of us who, through our hard work, have made a home here, raised our kids here, and maybe even been able to do a little better than just scratch out a living, in the most expensive place to live in the country. It is easy to understand why we're suspicious of change, worried that the problems we worked so hard to escape are following us to this place of sanctuary. Long Island has a welldeserved reputation as being the home of NIMBY (Not In My Backyard), maybe because we worked hard to get here, and we want it to stay this way. But that's not how life works, and as we witness the struggles of the next generation forced to leave in search of affordable housing, the greying of our population, the intractable problems we have with the cost of living, with the incredible gap between the have and havenots, it becomes increasingly obvious our focus on maintaining the status quo has made it hard for us to adapt as life requires. Maybe, in our love for our island, we have forgotten the teachings of the Bible that call us to remember that life is change, that the things of this world, are either growing or decaying and dying and that when we try to slam the door on change, we have chosen the latter. When our zeal for preservation makes us forget to practice God's love as hospitality to the stranger, care of the needy, and an openness to the breath of the Spirit that blows where it will, we turn away from life in favor of fear and find that we are chipping away at the spirit of community that makes this place the home it has been for us. "This is the guilt of your sister Sodom:" God says through the prophet Ezekiel, "she and her daughters had pride, excess of food and prosperous ease, but did not aide the poor and needy." When we focus too much on building walls, on protecting what we have, we close the door to what can be, and close our ears to the voice of our still-speaking God, who is

calling us to see that genuine sanctuary is built on faith and not on fear, with a door that is open to all.

The truth is, there is no such thing as stand-I ing still, even on the mountaintop. Life goes on and it changes. Ours is a dynamic God; a Redeemer seeking us out, calling us up and out of our comfortable places and inviting us to be part the new thing that he is doing: the souls transformed, the dry bones of old assumptions and old ways suddenly giving way to new ways of living and being as we learn to let go of what was, to have faith in the future and to trust our will and our lives to God. As long as we live in faith, we can greet the inevitability of change with joyful anticipation instead of resistance, because God is still speaking, still calling us to something new and better. We can let go of that baggage of suspicion and fear as our faith transforms our hearts and our lives because God has even better things in store for us all.

s I begin to prepare for our last church year Ltogether, I cannot help but remember our first years, and the extraordinary faith and determination of this little church to be a light to this community and all who seek to share the Word of Life. On paper, Bethany looked like a bad bet, but you showed me, my family, and anyone else with eyes to see the power of God's love lived by people determined to live by kin-dom rules, rather than conventional wisdom. That's what has made Bethany the bright shining "city on a hill" that it is and in that spirit, it will continue to be.

h, and, if you see me doing weird things like stroking the wood of the pews or sitting in the sanctuary or smiling stupidly, I'm drinking it all in, holding you all close, and storing grace for the days to come, for when I need to remember what God's love looks like at church.


### VANDERBILT: The Rise and Fall of an American Dynasty



# FUN FACTS ABOUT FALL

When the air starts getting crisp and the smell of pumpkin pie spice is all around, then you know that the Fall Season has arrived! It will soon be time to enjoy beautiful autumn foliage, go apple picking and stock up on Halloween treats. Here are a few facts you might like to know about this wonderful time of the year!

**A mericans typically refer to this time of year as "Fall,"** while the British use the word "Autumn." Historically, Fall was called "harvest" because of the "harvest moon" that occurs close to the autumn equinox.

**F**all colors are caused by the amount of sugar in leaves. The redder the leaf, the more sugar that leaf is storing. That is why Maple trees are so vibrant. Evergreens don't change because their leaves have a thick wax covering that protects the chlorophyl (green) in the leaves.

The Fall season is caused by the Earth's tilt, not by our distance from the sun. When the northern hemisphere tilts towards the sun, we get warmer. When it tilts away, we get colder. Fall and spring are the times of transition.

**ncient people wore Halloween costumes to hide from ghosts.** The Celtic tradition believed that ghosts roamed the earth on Halloween. Wearing a disguise would help you to avert these spirits.

The Irish used to carve turnips and potatoes. Much like Halloween costumes, Jack-O-Lanterns started out as a way for people to scare off evil spirits around Halloween. Back in the day, the Irish carved the faces into turnips, beets, or potatoes instead of pumpkins.

**B**obbing for apples was once a British courting ritual. In this old-fashioned Halloween party game, men were assigned an apple and the women would bob for them trying to get the right apple from the man she had her eye on. If she was successful, it was taken as an omen that they were meant to be together.

There are more than 7,500 apple varieties. There is an amazing number of apple varieties that are grown around the globe. According to *The Best of Life* there are 2,500 types grown in the US and 7,500 types in total. Since apples are so good for you, you can choose the one you like and make sure to eat one a day to keep the doctor away!


