I hristmas is coming! Trim the lights, put up the decorations, and let the shopping frenzy begin! There's great sights and smells everywhere, corny holiday music, decorated streets and the inevitable sourpusses crying about a war on Christmas, just to balance things out. I have to admit I've missed all the craziness of the season these past years. And I admit that while I probably should be writing something preachy about crass commercialism, right now I am so excited to see the season return that I don't care how many times I have to relive the tragedy of Rudolph the Reindeer or seek enlightenment with Charlie Brown or worry about what some greeter says at the mall. I am just intoxicated with the hustle and the bustle of the season, thrilled to see our ministries here at Bethany unfold with folks back at it again, feeding the hungry, clothing the naked and trying to live the Gospel with all the joyous enthusiasm that the coming of Christ deserves. It's almost as if there is something in the air this year, a kind of excitement about the possibility of some reconciliation and re-connection. Maybe it's a hope that after the pandemic, and the politics, after too much suffering and too much tragedy, that people are ready to take a deep breath and try to remember that my neighbor is really not a evil doer, he's just a guy, like he was even before he put that awful sign on his yard last year, or yelled at me for wearing (or not

wearing) a mask. Maybe we can see then that though we have been slogging through the wilderness of our own struggles overloaded with our fears and our baggage, we can finally begin to open our eyes, finally be ready to see the Star in the Eastern Sky that lights the way to the coming of the kin-dom of God, the light that has shone on through the pandemic, through war and violence, through our plunges into sin. The light, as it says in the Gospel of John, that shone in the darkness and the darkness could not overcome it. We preachers like to go on about "the true meaning of Christmas," and in normal times for those of us privileged enough to participate with full bellies and long gifts lists, it can be hard to let go of all the trappings long enough to know that spirit. The world, for us at least, is so different from that at the time of Jesus' birth. The holidays, as special as they are, can become rote, about the medium rather than the message as we run ourselves to exhaustion and fiscal ruin trying to buy that spirit, all the time feeling guilty for giving in to the madness.

This year feels a little different, though. Maybe it's because we found out that you can order a present online, but you can't order presence that way. We found out as we watched people we loved fighting for their lives on screens or through Covid barriers how much we need to touch each other, how much we'd rather have grandmom whole and with us than the newest gadget or that article of clothing,

(especially when we can't go out anyway). Maybe, we've finally started to figure out how much we miss each other- and not just family and friends, but the guy at the coffee shop we saw every Wednesday, or the people on the street, the lady walking the big dog, the guy at the newsstand and all the people who make up the world in which we live in, back, busy and filling up our days with the sights and sounds of life itself. Truly a gift!

aybe what I'm really feeling is hope. Hope that we have developed eyes to see the tenacity of our need for one anotherspecifically, that integral image of God within each of us that reaches out to the other even as we are torn apart by politics or prejudice, by racism and sexism, by pandemics and pundits seeking to drive us apart. Even as we smack each other around all day long, we are beginning to see that we miss each other, we need each other, that we cannot be complete without each other. Christmas is about the incredible power of life to persist, to seek out the light of the sun, to keep finding a way to grow

and to thrive no matter what may come, and it is about the power of love, not to conquer or destroy what is evil, but to transform it through grace into good. Like the shepherds on the first Christmas, my eyes are peeled, and my ears opened as I try and prepare to witness this miracle of the incarnation yet again for the first time. Maybe this year, after all that we have been through together, maybe this time, as we determine to get up, dust ourselves off and try again, we will see the light of God's in our neighbor's eye or look around and remember how good we have it and how blessed we really are. Maybe it'll inspire us to scan the eastern sky like shepherds for the voices of angels and the light of a star, help us to remember that into the darkness of human suffering, into the chaos and insanity of our hurting world, God came among us as one of us and through the Spirit, promised to be with us always. And He is- always!

December Greetings to all,



It's hard to imagine Christmas without a Christmas tree, isn't it? But why do we associate a tree with this celebration? History.com just provided me with an indepth explanation but I'll just share some highlights.

The story starts a very long time ago. Ancient Egyptians, Celts, Druids, Romans, and even Vikings recognized evergreen plants as having great symbolic significance. Plants and trees that stay green through the long cold dark winter? I get it! Evergreen boughs were hung over doorways and windows to keep out witches, ghosts, and all sorts of evils. Let's speed up the clock to the 1500s. German Christians started bringing decorated trees into their homes. Rumor has it that Martin Luther, himself, started

the practice of adding lit candles to the trees. Maybe not so safe in a world without smoke detectors but it caught on anyway. This is also the time when the triangle shape of the tree became symbolic as the Holy Trinity.

hristmas trees didn't make it over to America until much later and were not well received by many. Even in the 1840s, most Americans felt they were undesirable pagan symbols. The Puritans had even created laws against such frivolous practices. But, in 1846, there was Queen Victoria and the royal family shown standing around a Christmas tree. Boom! Suddenly, it became fashionable and very much in vogue. By 1890, the trees and ornaments were quite popular but while Europeans used trees about 4 feet high, Americans, in their typical bigger is better perspective, liked floor to ceiling sized trees!

ere are some interesting facts about Christmas trees around the world:

- Great Britain prefers the Norway spruce for its trees.
- Christmas trees in Greenland are all imported. It is so far north; no trees live there. In Sweden, many tree decorations, such as stars, sunbursts, and snowflakes, are made of straw.
- Norwegians like to select their tree right from the woods. The tree is decorated by the parents behind closed doors while the children wait excitedly outside the room. When the children are allowed in, everyone joins hands in a circle around the tree and walks around it singing carols. Ah now I understand the beginning of the Nutcracker Suite much better.



- What do you do when Christmas falls in summer where you live? In Brazil, people sometimes put pieces of cotton on pine trees to represent snow.
- In the Philippines, trees are very expensive. Handmade trees made out of bamboo do the job and are decorated with colored rice paper.
- And here in the U.S.A., we now have Christmas tree farms in all 50 states of the U.S. That's a lot of trees!

n the third Sunday of Advent (December 11th) some of the Sobey family were in attendance and graciously lit one of the Advent Candles.






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

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
