"For everything there is a season..." Ecclesiastes 3:1a

ay is one of my favorite months, because it is ■ so bursting with life and with hope after the cold, damp days of winter. The sun is warm, the birds are out, and the air feels heavy with anticipation of the summer, my favorite time on Long Island. Usually, I'd be breaking out the lawn mower to try and tame the grass that seems to have gotten knee high in less than a week, but this year is different. For one thing, I gave away my lawn mower, so I have to wait for the lawn guy to come next week. For another thing, I'm moving away and every time I think of some little thing around the house I need to do for Spring, I remember that in a few weeks, I won't need to order more bird seed for the feeder, or take Stormy for a walk down by the water front, because the lives we have made here will be over, and the big house on Rhame Avenue will no longer be our home.

ur boys grew up here and have made lives here, and they can't imagine any place they'd rather be despite the economic obstacles. That means we will be back, if not to live, then at least to visit. It also says something about the kind of community this is. They say it takes a village to raise a child, and mine have grown up in a church that taught them about the power of love as part of a community that loves people as they are. They learned that not just at home, but especially here at Bethany, where everybody, (to steal a phrase) is somebody special, just as they are in the eyes of God.

I guess I grew up here too. We came here because we could sense the determination of this congregation to live and grow as the beating heart of this community and feel the breathe of the Holy Spirit in a place that had labored on for years without pastoral leadership and yet still hung on to its devotion to our

faith through holy hospitality, and through openness to the many ways that God is still speaking through worship, through prayer and through the winds of change that were blowing off the ocean and calling this congregation to a new life. Kate and I were so impressed by the humor, the deep faith, and the commitment to community we found in this overlooked little church that we decided to come and be a part of it.

nd we did. We prayed together, we worshiped Logether, we sought to reach out and gather the people of Jesus to his house. Most of the time, it was clear by any algorithm you could name that our little church was not viable financially, or terribly "successful." It grew slowly, not by marketing, but by living the discipleship that we were called to; by feeding the hungry, clothing the naked in our thrift shop, by meeting people where they are, giving them a place to be, by encouraging folks in their struggles and by opening our doors to our community: to all of those groups and activities that serve to strengthen the spirit of this garden in which we have been planted. In normal times and through terror attacks, floods, pandemics and all manner of disasters, Bethany has always been there to meet the needs of all comers in Christ's name and you have always had the flexibility and the courage to embrace the change that is what the abundant life is all about.

The truth is, that whether in prayer and worship, or in service, Bethany Congregational Church is the most authentic expression of our faith that I have ever seen. It was founded by members of 11 different denominations who overcame their differences to create first a Sunday School and then a

church, and it is maintained by a congregation who understand that our faith is all about the law of love, worshiped and lived in a communion of disciples with open hearts, open minds, and open hands. I didn't bring that here, I found it here. Everything that I had learned about church administration and church planning in seminary told me that Bethany was a "bad bet.". It was broke, shrinking, and in an area that was not conducive to growth. But this congregation determined to live and to serve, choosing blessings over curses. With the help of the Holy Spirit, you made it happen. You understood that God made the Sabbath for humanity and not humanity for the Sabbath so Bethany has become a people's church, just as Jesus would want it to be: an open door and an open hand.

am heartbroken to leave Bethany, but I know you got this. Remember who and whose you are: disciples of the Risen Christ, bearers of the Good News of God's eternal grace to all the broken places and people of the world. Nothing is more important than authentic worship except for authentic grace lived out in service. Remember that God really, really DOES love you and that it is growing together in communion that we realize the first fruits of that

love as we seek to live the lives Christ calls us to. And perhaps most of all, remember that people are complex and unique, each and every one of us. Our political beliefs, our struggles with our mental or physical health, our socio-economic status, race and sexual orientation are part of who we are, but none of them is as important as the image of God that shines from within all of us. In this divided and violent time, when so many others are retreating into the silos of "us vs them," it is more important than ever that we hold up the light of welcome to all of God's people, holding fast to the law of love that transcends the divisions of our culture. No one does that better than this congregation. That's why I know that the future is pregnant with possibilities for this church, and I am confident for the future, not to mention blessed and exceedingly grateful for all the gifts that you have given to my family and to me.




